
#### **Programme Intended Learning Outcomes (PILOs):**

#### **Programme Profile**

#### **Master of Arts in Applied Social Sciences**



#### **Programme Features**

- > Students can decide on their own study path, schedule and load for each semester in order to complete the programme in 1 or 2 to 5 years. Such a flexible structure allows students to pace and plan their own study to best suit their personal and career development needs.
- ▶ MA degree with two main streams 1) Sociology and 2) Criminology. Applicants are required to indicate the selected stream when submitting applications; and admitted students are not allowed a change of stream.
- ➤ The Stream courses will be taught by a strong team of experts from sociology, criminology, psychology, social work, counselling and psychology backgrounds. Students from various backgrounds also form circles to enrich synergy for effective learning.

#### **Stream 1: Sociology**

- ► Core courses provide a solid foundation on applied sociology theories and social research methodologies.
- Integrative Project" is an opportunity for students to apply sociological theories, methods and ethics. The Project focuses on an actual problem or issue.
- Students can select any two electives from a list of courses in different fields.

#### **Stream 2: Criminology**

▶ The stream aims at training students in becoming competent researchers and/or practitioners at an advanced level in the key areas of policing and offender rehabilitation.

#### **Entrance Requirements**

To be eligible for admission, you must:

- ▶ hold a recognised bachelor's degree from one of the universities in Hong Kong or from any overseas institution recognised for this purpose by the University; or
- ▶ hold such other qualifications as deemed acceptable by the University as equivalent to the above.

Applicants whose entrance qualification is obtained from an institution where the medium of instruction is not English should also fulfill the following minimum English proficiency requirement:

- ▶ a score of 79 (Internet-based test) on the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)<sup>®‡</sup>; or
- an overall band score of 6.5 in International English Language Testing System (IELTS)<sup>®</sup>; or
- a score of 450 of band 6 in the Chinese mainland's College English Test; or
- other equivalent qualifications.
- @ TOEFL and IELTS scores are considered valid for two years. Applicants are required to provide their English test results obtained within the two years preceding the commencement of the University's application period.
- # Applicants are required to arrange for the Educational Testing Service (ETS) to send their TOEFL results directly to the University. The TOEFL institution code for CityU is 3401.

#### **Programme Structure**

There are no intermediate exits, students may obtain the MA degree by completing a total of 6 credit units of common core courses, and

- ▶ 18 credit units core courses and 6 credit units electives for "Sociology Stream" or
- ▶ 21 credit units core courses and 3 credit units electives for "Criminology Stream" or

#### **Career Prospects**

#### **Stream 1: Sociology**

Sample areas of employment in applied sociology are, for example, in the following fields and organisations: private research and consulting firms, government and public sector organisations, political parties and interest groups, third sector and civil society organisations, marketing and advertising firms, public relations and media firms, social services agencies, and education sector.

Graduates may also pursue postgraduate programmes in sociology, psychology, social welfare and human services at the doctoral level.

#### **Stream 2: Criminology**

Graduates in criminology could pursue a career in law enforcement/ disciplinary forces (e.g. Hong Kong Police Force, Hong Kong Correctional Services Department, Independent Commission Against Corruption, Hong Kong Immigration Department, Hong Kong Customs and Excise Department, and Hong Kong Fire Services Department), private security agencies (e.g. corporate security firms, threat assessment and management agencies, anti-fraud agencies, and private investigative agencies), and non-governmental organisations that serve the forensic and related populations (e.g. exoffenders, drug abusers, victims of crime, and at-risk youth). Graduates may also pursue postgraduate programmes in criminology, criminal justice, and other related fields (e.g. forensic psychology, law, and social work) at the doctoral level.

#### **Programme Aims**

This conversion program is designed to provide non-psychology degree holders with the knowledge, skills, exposure, and insights for (1) analyzing human behaviors from a psychological perspective, (2) developing research expertise in applying psychology to relevant settings, and (3) pursuing advanced professional training and a career in psychology and closely related areas. Upon completion of the program, students will be eligible to apply for graduate membership of the Hong Kong Psychological Society.


#### **Programme Intended Learning Outcomes (PILOs):**

Upon successful completion of this Programme, students should be able to:

- critically evaluate major principles/ theories in core areas of psychology
- apply major psychological theories/principles to analyze human behaviors in real life situations;
- critically evaluate research evidence published in psychological journals;
- design and carry out psychological research independently; and
- appreciate the close connection between psychology and everyday experiences.

#### **Programme Profile**

#### **Master of Social Sciences in Psychology**



#### **Programme Features**

- Designed primarily to provide degree-holders having no undergraduate training in psychology to pursue further study and a career in psychology.
- Focus on the cultivation of a distinctive blend of knowledge and skills relevant to advanced training and different careers in psychology.
- ▶ Multiple concentrations catering for different interests and career aspirations.
- Classes meet primarily on weekday evenings.
- Credit Transfer could be granted for equivalent level of study.

#### **Entrance Requirements**

To be eligible for admission, you must satisfy the General Entrance Requirements and:

- ▶ have a recognized bachelor's degree from one of the universities in Hong Kong or from any overseas institutions recognized for this purpose by the University;
- b hold such other qualifications as deemed acceptable by the University as equivalent to the above; or
- have evidence of academic and professional attainments acceptable for this purpose by the University; AND
- ▶ provide documentary evidence that they have a) completed a course of introductory psychology offered by a recognized university or institution, or b) obtained relevant learning or working experiences related to psychology.

An introductory course in psychology is considered to be a course which is taught at the undergraduate level and (1) provides an overview of major topics in psychology such as biopsychology, perception, cognition, learning, motivation, emotion, intelligence, personality and social psychology, and (2) lasts at least for one semester.

Applicants who do not have previous experience in psychology may enroll in a make-up course to meet the admission requirement. For more details about the make-up course (SS1101 Basic Psychology), please read the Enrollment information: https://www.admo.cityu.edu.hk/exchange\_visiting/visiting/info/. Applicants who plan to apply for admission to a particular academic year can enroll in the make-up course in the second semester of the preceding academic year or earlier. Application for enrolment in the make-up course usually starts at the end of the first semester of the preceding academic year.

Applicants whose entrance qualification is obtained from an institution where the medium of instruction is not English should also fulfill the following minimum English proficiency requirement:

- ▶ a score of 79 (Internet-based test) on the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)@#; or
- an overall band score of 6.5 in International English Language Testing System (IELTS)@; or
- ▶ a score of 450 of band 6 in the Chinese mainland's College English Test; or
- other equivalent qualifications

Remarks: For the Education stream, preference will be given to those who have had at least 2 years working experience in the educational setting. For both streams, prior knowledge about research methods and statistics would be an advantage.

#### **Professional Accreditation**

Upon completion of the program, students will be eligible to apply for graduate membership of the Hong Kong Psychological Society. However, membership is granted on the basis of individual merits but not automatically upon application.

#### **Career Prospects**

The master award allows graduates to pursue further study in psychology via the enrolment in research-based programs (e.g. MPhil or PhD) or professional training (e.g. clinical, educational, occupational, or counseling psychology). A number of graduates of the predecessors of this programme have already become either researchers (e.g. college professors) or registered psychologists in clinical, education, occupational or counselling psychology.

Upon graduation, students who are qualified teachers and with a concentration in the Education stream are expected to be competent in teaching in inclusive settings.

#### **Programme Aims**

This programme aims to develop the competence of professional practitioners working in a broad range of human services by offering professional and advanced education in counselling.

#### For beginners in counselling:

- To acquire understanding of counselling theories and psychothrapies as well as case analyses and micro-counselling skills;
- ▶ To build up competence and personal qualities as professional counsellor;
- To apply counselling knowledge and skills in practice; and
- To prepare for advanced-level education and training.

#### For practitioners with experience in counselling:

- ▶ To critically re-examine counselling theories and the 'theory-practice' link;
- ▶ To develop into a reflective practitioner with insights in self and practice;
- ► To set theoretical formulations and conduct ongoing assessment for devising appropriate intervention; and
- ▶ To build up cultural sensitivity and appreciation of client knowledge and strength.

#### **Programme Features**

- ► For counselling practicum, the department will help students arrange their practicum sites as closely to their preference as possible. Students can also select their practicum sites on their own for practice training upon approval by the Practicum Coordinator.
- Excellent quality and ratio between the client contact hours and supervision hours in 2:1 in Counseling Practicum, consisting of 120 face-to-face direct client contact hours under 26 individual supervision hours and 36 group supervision hours.
- ► The graduates not only could register as a full member at Hong Kong Professional Counselling Association (HKPCA) but for those complete the counselling practicum also could register at British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy (BACP) in the United Kingdom and Australian Counselling Association (ACA) in Australia.
- This programme has been recognized by the Hosptial Authority (HA), the Occupational Therapist (II) and the Radiotherapist (II) ranks could be eligible to apply for the promotion to (I) rank.
- A common core in 'general counselling' with choices of programme electives in three areas: General electives; Research methods; and Specialised electives.

- For part-time students: A choice of two-semester practicum route or research route of professional preparation; for full-time students: An accelerated two-semester research route of academic preparation.
- Multiple exit points (Postgraduate Certificate in Counselling (PGCC), Postgraduate Diploma in Counselling (PGDC), and Master of Social Sciences in Counselling (MSSC)).

#### **Does this Programme Suit You?**

This is a programme for:

- Counsellors and social workers seeking continuous professional education in counselling;
- ► Teachers providing school counselling service and 'embedded counselling' in classroom interaction with students;
- Health professionals working in medical and mental health settings;
- Human service professionals working with children, young people, parents, couples, and families; and
- Human resource managers responsible for personnel work, career counselling, and employee welfare.

#### **Course Load and Duration**

- Part-time students normally take a course load of 6 to 9 credits (about 2 to 3 courses) per semester and complete the programme within 2 to 5 years.
- Full-time students normally take a course load of 12 to 18 credits (about 4 to 6 courses) per semester and complete the programme within 1 to 2.5 years.
- Classes will be held on weekday evenings and Saturday afternoons/evenings.

#### **Entrance Requirement**

To be eligible for admission, you must



- have obtained an equivalent qualification, or provide evidence of academic and professional attainments acceptable for this purpose by the University; and
- have preferably two years' working experience in social service, education, health, human services, human resources or related areas.

Applicants whose entrance qualification is obtained from an institution where the medium of instruction is not English should also fulfill the following minimum English proficiency requirement:

- ▶ a score of 79 (Internet-based test) on the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)<sup>@#</sup>; or
- an overall band score of 6.5 in International English Language Testing System (IELTS)<sup>®</sup>; or
- a score of 450 of band 6 in the Chinese mainland's College English Test; or
- other equivalent qualifications.

#### **Curriculum Highlight**

#### **SS5800 Counselling Theories and Practice**

... to critically examine how selected counselling theories and therapy models are being used by practitioners in the context of exploring the positivist epistemology of counselling practice as revealed in the connection between theories and practice, and to make accurate case analyses and assessment on theoretical formulations. Then to devise an appropriate and specific counselling intervention for each individual. Integration of counselling theories and practice is highlighted.

## SS6806 Counselling Practicum (part-time mode only)

... to provide practice-based instruction of knowledge, attitudes, and skills required for effective participation in the counselling profession with confidence. It is the culminating activity in the training of professional counsellors with the opportunity for students to apply, under professional support through group and individual supervisions, counselling theories and skills integrally in real-world practice.

#### SS6805 Project

... to provide hands-on experience in initiating, planning and implementing an independent research project with the view to foster disciplined thinking as a researcher and to develop the capacity for constructing counselling knowledge through empirical investigation.

#### Students may obtain the MSSC degree either by completing

- ▶ Path A full-time mode in one year with taking Project; or
- ▶ Path B part-time mode in two years with taking either Project or Counselling Practicum

#### **Programme Structure**

Programme curriculum is made up of (a) core courses; and (b) elective courses forming a "general electives" group, a "research methods" group, and a "specialised electives" group.

To graduate with the MSSC award, full-time students must complete the Project (two-semester course) in Semester B and Summer Term in their first year of study; for part-time students, to complete either the Counselling Practicum or the Project (both are two-semester courses) before the completion.

For Counselling Practicum, practicum sites for students to fulfill 120 clinical hours with 26 individual and 36 group supervision hours will be arranged in practicum practice.

#### **Professional Accreditation**

The MSSC programme has been accredited by the Hong Kong Professional Counselling Association (HKPCA) since 2011. All graduates after 2004 could be eligible to apply for a full membership at HKPCA.

In addition, our graduates who have completed the Counselling Practicum are eligible to run for Certified Counsellor. The HKPCA recognises all the 120 face-to-face direct client contact hours and 26 individual supervision hours as well as 36 group supervision hours. Therefore, these abovementioned MSSC graduates could pursue the status of "Certified Counsellor" after fulfilling the required post-master face-to-face direct client contact hours and supervision hours by HKPCA Approved Supervisor.

Furthermore, graduates in the practicum route can also be recognized for membership registration by the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy (BACP) in the United Kingdom and the Australian Counselling Association (ACA) in Australia.

#### **Career Prospects**

The programme is designed for graduates from diverse disciplinary backgrounds and supports continual professional development. It opens up career fields and enhances career advancement in human services (notably counselling, social work, and health care), education, and human resources management where sensitivity and effectiveness in working with people is an asset.

The MSW programme is a self-funded programme with the aim to train professionals qualifying for recognised social work qualification (RSW) at the Master's degree level. It aspires to train students becoming ethically-oriented social work practitioners being competent, reflective and good in professional practice.

On successful completion of the programme, students should be able to

- use appropriate knowledge, theories and demonstrate skills in social work in order to become competent and professional in their practice;
- reflect on their own practice so that they can intellectually construct, articulate and evaluate their own philosophy and practice in reference to social work values and ethics;
- demonstrate the ability to integrate theory in practice in an innovative way, discover and examine culturally relevant social work practice;
- evaluate professional activities and service programmmes, changing social needs and advocacy for appropriate welfare reforms and service delivery.

#### **Programme Features**

- ≥ 2 years for the full-time MSW degree, with 1 concurrent placement in Year 2 Semester A and 1 block fieldwork placement in Year 2 Semester B (maximum study period: 5 years). Concurrent fieldwork placement is conducted in 17 weeks with 3 days per week or 6 sessions whereas block fieldwork placement is conducted in 10 weeks with 5 days per week;
- ➤ 3 years for the part-time MSW degree to students taking two concurrent fieldwork placements in Year 2 and 3 Semester A & B respectively (maximum study period: 7.5 years). Concurrent fieldwork placement in the part-time study mode is conducted in 25 weeks with 2 days per week or 4 sessions per week;
- ▶ The MSW programme consists of 15 core courses amounting to 49 credits plus another 2 electives carrying 6 credits, making a total of 55 credit-units in the programme;
- ▶ 900 fieldwork training hours (800 hours direct fieldwork placements plus 100 hours placement preparation or related activities);
- Strengthening of the training in social work values and ethics, theories and practice to three courses emphasizing working with individuals and families, groups, community work and macrolevel social work practice;
- Addition of human behavior and social environment course subject areas, and social sciences theories for social work to those students without a social sciences training background;
- Legal knowledge and perspectives for social workers; enhancing mental health training, practice-related electives and advocacy for social work students;
- Integrative Social Work Seminar to train students becoming competent, reflective and good in professional practice.

#### **Programme Features**

The curriculum of the year 1 of full-time 2 years mode and the year 1 and year 2 of part-time 3 years mode aspires to train students with ethical principles and foundations of social work practice, social work values, and professional ethics, theories and practice skills in working with individual and families, groups and community, social welfare policies, social welfare management, legal issues for social workers and social work research methods. The curriculum of the year 2 of full-time 2 years mode and the year 2 and year 3 of part-time 3 years mode strives to equip students to have the required professional supervised fieldwork training hours and the 100-hour Practicum-related learning workshops, plus the study of Integrative Social Work Seminar and elective courses in practice-related social work practice settings: e.g. Assessment and Interventions in Mental Health Counselling, Cognitive-Behavioural Interventions, Group Counselling and Therapy, Counselling Children and Youth, Working with Families in Transition, Counselling Older Adults. Students who (1) are non-social sciences graduates, or (2) have taken either psychology or sociology but not the other, are required to complete non-credit bearing Social Sciences Workshops SS5115 Social Sciences Theories for Social Work\*. These workshops are to be run in an intensive mode on Saturday within the first five weeks of the semester.

#### **Entrance Requirements**

To be eligible for admission, you must:

- ▶ hold a recognised bachelor's degree from one of the universities in Hong Kong or from any overseas institution recognised for this purpose by the University; or
- lack hold such other qualifications as deemed acceptable by University as equivalent to the above; and
- pass an admission interview.

Applicants whose entrance qualification is obtained from an institution where the medium of instruction is not English should also fulfill the following minimum English proficiency requirement:

- ▶ a score of 79 (Internet-based test) on the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)<sup>@#</sup>; or
- an overall band score of 6.5 in International English Language Testing System (IELTS)<sup>®</sup>; or
- a score of 450 of band 6 in the Chinese mainland's College English Test; or
- other equivalent qualifications.
- @ TOEFL and IELTS scores are considered valid for two years. Applicants are required to provide their English test results obtained within the two years preceding the commencement of the University's application period.
